



#### **FEASIBILTY STUDY**

- 3. Economic Feasibility- Cost-Benefit analysis.
- 4. Technical Feasibility- Risk assessment & solutions.

This types can help and identify the financial, legal and all challenges of a proposed project by evaluating: What exposures the students are acquiring from the campus, What the estimate would be to fund new projects etc.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

This study is designed to help decision-makers determine whether or not a proposed project or investment is likely to be successful. It identifies both the known costs and the expected benefits. A Feasibility study starts with a preliminary analysis. Stakeholders are interviewed, students opinions are conducted, and a strategic plan is prepared. All of this information is analysed to make an initial "go" or "no-go" decision.

If it's a go, the real study can begin. This includes listing the technological considerations, studying the student's behaviors, describing the academic strategy and outlining the necessary human capital, project schedule and financing requirements.

The seating capacity of the library reading room is 200. #### 2.3 ICT ENABLED CLASSROOMS

#### **INTRODUCTION**

Information and Communication Technology (ICT) in education is the mode of education that use information and communications technology to support, enhance, and optimise the delivery of information. ICT enabled classroom includes computers, projectors, speakers, touch pad-pen, learning software and mobile applications. ICT used in the classroom is important for giving students opportunities for effective learning. Currently the institution has 29 ICT enabled classrooms. The institution is in a pace to convert all the classrooms to ICT enabled ones by 2027 with the support of PTA fund.



#### **OBJECTIVE**

One way to improve the quality of education is to make use of efficient technology in an institution. This will open up more opportunities for the teachers and students as well.

- Turning all the classrooms into ICT enabled ones will help students to become competent and confident users.
- It aims to equip learners with the appropriate social skills required to cooperate with fellow ICT learners for a more productive learning experience.
- To empower students who are unable to use this technology outside the institution by ensuring sufficient access to those students.
- To facilitate better involvement of the students in learning activities as the number of smart classes would increase, thus promoting better social understanding.
- ICT aims to assist students to grow personally by facilitating different methods of learning.

ICT in education improves engagement and knowledge retention: When ICT is integrated into curriculum; students become more engaged in their work. This is because technology provides different opportunities to make it more fun and enjoyable in terms of teaching the same things in different ways. It improves the effectiveness of education. It enhances scope of education by facilitating mobile learning and inclusive education. It facilitates research and scholarly communication.

# **FREESHIPS**

### YIMS FREESHIP POLICY

The aspirants who wish to pursue their academic journey in Yuvakshetra Institute of Management Studies most often face the herculean task of arranging funds. To overcome this, the institution has made provisions to aid them. Freeship is basically a financial aid offered to students for pursuing their studies by providing a concession in their fee amount. The amount of concession will be fixed by the management depending upon the financial background of meritorious students.

#### **SCHEME**

- 1. Palakkad Diocese Students Scholarship (PDSS): The scholarship is awarded to those students who have scored more than ninety percentage of marks in the Higher Secondary Examination and should be under the Diocese of Palakkad.
- 2. Yuvakshetra Educational Scholarship Project (YESP): The YESP scheme provides freeship to a fixed percentage of students from both UG and PG every year. This is highly beneficial for students and ensures that a maximum number of deserving students benefit from it each year. In addition, as an initiative of IQAC, PG students provided with benefits for SWAYAM/Project/Internship/Add-On/Others. additional provisions significantly contribute to digital empowerment by fostering the development of critical digital skills and enhancing technological literacy among students.
- **3.** Employees' Children Freeship: Freeships will be provided for employees' children studying in the college.
- **4. Installment Facility:** Students who cannot pay their fee completely are given the opportunity to pay their fees in installments. The applications to avail this facility will only be approved by the Director.

#### Guidelines

Students availing any of the above Freeships must apply for it through an application letter along with all the necessary supporting documents. A student enrolled in the First Year of Degree or PG Courses, who is economically weak but diligent is eligible to apply. A Student Counsellor is appointed to have a complete review of the aspirants as inculcating evidence for the institution. Based on the report, the Institute will decide the concession for the Freeships.
